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Executive Summary

Introduction & Background

The Southwest Florida Water Management District (District) and Hernando County, with support from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, carried out a study regarding the recreational use of the Weeki Wachee River. The popularity of this destination as a recreational hub has highlighted concerns surrounding the degradation of the river and its ecosystems.

A study conducted by Wood Environment & Infrastructure Solutions showed that managing the kinds of activities that occur on the river and limiting where certain activities can occur may be as important, if not more important, as capping the number of users. Science-based recommendations were provided at the conclusion of the study with management options that could reduce the negative impacts of recreation on the river.

In February 2021, the District collaborated with The Taproot Agency to gather initial data in a social media pre-survey regarding visitor behaviors at the river. A District-led campaign began on March 1, 2021, to educate targeted audiences about the recreational best management practices that will help protect the Weeki Wachee River and reduce ecological impacts. Following the campaign, a post-survey was conducted via social media in November 2021 to determine whether behaviors have changed because of the campaign. The first annual survey was conducted via social media in 2022.

In July 2023, a request was made to the Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission for the establishment of a Weeki Wachee Springs Protection Zone. It was approved and now applies from the headspring within Weeki Wachee Springs State Park to approximately 5.61 miles downriver at Rogers Park. The protection in this designated zone prohibits anchoring, mooring, beaching or grounding of vessels within the spring and the associated portions of the spring run.

This report provides data gathered during an annual follow-up survey conducted via social media from October 24 – November 7, 2025, to monitor potential continued behavior change as well as initial testing of knowledge of, and likelihood of complying with, the springs protection zone rules.

Methods of Data Collection and Analysis

The Taproot Agency deployed a social media survey using the Meta ads function. The ad was active October 24 – November 7, 2025, and gathered 441 total responses.

Due to the growing number of data points across the surveys conducted since 2021, the 2021 post-campaign data and annual 2022 data have been removed from this report. The baseline set in the 2021 pre-campaign remains for comparison.

As in previous Weeki Wachee surveys, parameters were set for the Facebook ad to run in the geographic area of the following Florida counties: Citrus, Hernando, Hillsborough, Pasco, Pinellas and Polk. Respondents were only excluded based on whether they had visited the Weeki Wachee River. If their response was “more than five years ago,” “don’t know” or “never visited,” they were terminated from the survey.

To avoid potentially skewed results/reactions and mirror the pre-survey, the members/followers of the following Facebook groups were also removed from this post-survey data: Friends of Weeki Wachee Preserve, Weeki

Wachee River Rescue Team and Weeki Wachee River Rangers. 69% of respondents indicated not being a member of any of the social media groups, including those removed from this data.

As in previous years, the survey sample resulted in a theoretical margin of error of approximately +/-4% at the 95% confidence level.

Post-Survey Insights

The following insights were gleaned from the 2025 annual survey data represented in this report as compared to responses in previous surveys.

- While other resources are still utilized in planning a visit to the river, the most common (top three) are the same as in 2024:
 - I'm a local resident (59%)
 - Visited previously (46%)
 - Social media (16%)
- Respondents were asked to identify up to three activities they participate in while on the river.
 - The top three recreational activities identified by respondents remained the same from 2024:
 - Kayak or Canoe (74%)
 - Swim or snorkel (54%)
 - Observe wildlife (62%)
- Regarding exiting vessels on the river, responses were like previous surveys:
 - 5%-point increase in those indicating they do not exit their vessel while on the river
 - 3%-point increase in those indicating they let their vessel float freely while on the river
- Opinions recorded in how many respondents agreed with statements regarding actions while on the river were largely like the 2024 survey. Variations are noted below:
 - A 1%-point increase was recorded in those that remain neutral on whether sandy white bottoms are a sign of an unhealthy spring. For this statement, a 3%-point increase was recorded in those that "strongly agree" and, similarly, a 3%-point increase in those that "disagree."
 - A combined 4%-point decrease was recorded for those in agreement ("strongly agree" and "agree") that the number of vessels should be limited on the river. This change was reflected in the combined 4%-point increase in those that disagree ("disagree" and "strongly disagree"), as those remaining neutral stayed the same from 2024.
 - Those in agreement ("strongly agree" and "agree") that vessels should only be allowed to park in the designated spots on the river saw a collective 6%-point increase.
- All previous surveys tested respondents' ability to recognize current challenges with the river.
 - The top three challenges remained the same as the 2024 survey.

- Too many motorized vehicles – no change recorded (71%)
- Too many people recreating on the river at one time – down 4% points
- Trampled vegetation – up 3% point
- All other listed challenges saw only a 1%-point change or no change since 2024.
- As in all previous surveys, when respondents were asked how likely they were to take certain actions if they knew it would benefit the health of the river, the majority responded they were very likely to take those actions.
 - **Increases** in those “very likely” to take actions to protect the river were recorded for the following:
 - Avoid docking on riverbanks – up 1% point
 - Avoid climbing on banks and walking on sand point bars – up 3% points
 - Don’t climb trees or use rope swings – up 2% points
 - **Follow the Springs Protection Zone rules – up 7% points**
 - There were **decreases** in respondents indicating they were “very likely” to take the following actions:
 - Stay in the vessel when possible – down 1% point (“not at all likely” increased by 3% points)
 - If you have to leave the vessel, tie off in shallow waters – down 8% points (“not at all likely” increased by 9% points)
- As in previous surveys, internet and social media outlets were two of the most memorable vehicles for campaign messaging. Significant increases were noted in the top three:
 - Social media – up 21% points
 - Internet – up 26% points
 - Unlike the 2024 survey, the Water Management District website was the third highest selection. An 11%-point increase was recorded from the previous survey.
- Finally, beginning with the 2023 annual survey, respondents’ knowledge of the springs protection zone was tested.
 - 72% of respondents indicated they had heard information about the springs protection zone, up 7% points from 2024.
 - Those who indicated they had heard information were then asked what activities they recalled are restricted with these rules. The top three selected were the same as 2024:
 - No anchoring, mooring, grounding or beaching of vessels – 92%
 - You must stay in your vessel at all times – 45%
 - No swimming or snorkeling – 27%
