The Southwest Florida Water Management District (District) is responsible for managing water resources for approximately 5 million residents living within a 10,000-square-mile area of west-central Florida. To help accomplish this mission, the District has protected more than 449,000 acres of land within its boundaries through land acquisitions and conservation easements.

District lands include natural floodplains, areas that replenish the aquifer, and areas around lakes, rivers, wetlands and estuaries that naturally filter out pollutants before they reach the nearest water body. These lands not only give people a chance to experience nature at its finest, they also play a vital role in Florida's water cycle.

While District lands vary in size and terrain, they all have at least one thing in common — they provide a variety of important benefits to the water and water-related resources within west-central Florida. The majority of these lands are available for public use and recreation. Nature-friendly activities offer a healthy, fun and educational experience while making sure the land is protected. In keeping with the purpose of these lands — protection of the environment — your experience will be close to nature. That means mostly unpaved trails, portable restrooms and nature's beauty all around you.
